

Unity and Church Organization

What will it take to achieve the unity of the New Testament church (Acts 2:37-47)? Is that kind of unity even important? Yes! It is commanded (John 17:20-21; 1 Cor 1:10)! Where do we begin? We must return to the simple New Testament pattern of church organization.

The church Jesus built is organized like a body comprised of many parts or members (Eph 1:22-23; 1 Cor 12:27). Unity within that body will prevail as each member submits to Christ (Eph 4:1-3; Phil 2:1-11). Unity becomes visible as members unite for worship and instruction (1 Cor 11-12; Heb 11:25).

Simplicity of organization characterized the early church. It had no ruling board with authority over many congregations. Each group was self-governing under the spiritual oversight of its elders (1 Tim 3). Their authority did not extend beyond the group from which they were selected (Acts 14:23; 20:17, 28; 1 Pet 5:1-4).

Deacons were appointed in each church to assist in the physical needs its members (Acts 6:1-6; 1 Tim 3:8-13). Everyone served the Lord together while submitting to the spiritual guidance of their elders (1 Thess 5:11-17; Heb 13:7, 17).

By order of the apostles, evangelists appointed elders and trained faithful men to teach and preach God's word (Titus 1:5-9; 2 Tim 2:2; 4:1-2). Women too were teachers. They were instructed to train younger women in their roles as wives, mothers and homemakers (Titus 2:3-5). Imagine all this work being accomplished without a single college or seminary. It is God's simple pattern of organization, and it will work if we will have faith enough to implement His plan and give Him the glory.
